Not surprisingly, we've spotlighted some of those hurdles in this newsletter, on our website, and on Facebook in hopes that folks might provide financial support. (Thankfully, many of you do!) For this issue, we'd like to take the opposite tack, by recognizing that we've had a pretty darned good year — and praying this rare spell of good fortune continues!

#### Saunders Mausoleum Project Completed

The prospect of renovating a circa-1888 mausoleum was daunting, but by plugging in the right professionals and with the right guidance (thank you to Board VP Brian Bosch and CRC Supervisor Danny Smith) — the twoyear renovation of the Charles W. Sanders family mausoleum was completed this summer. Funded by, and under the mandate of, the estate of Sudee Sanders (deceased, 2020), this effort was achieved thanks to the historic engineering expertise of Syracuse-based Klepper,

Hahn and Hyatt (thank you, Jim Palumbo!) and the construction skills and expert execution of R.E. Kelley Specialty Construction.

#### **Repaved Front Entrance**

Relatedly — and also enabled by the Sanders bequest, given its direct adjacency to the mausoleum — we were also able to repave the road-way surfaces of our front entrance and circles near our office and chapel! Here, the work was done by a well-reputed and cost-competitive local paving supplier (thanks, Daryl Anderson, and your crew at First Choice Asphalt) and involved removing the deteriorating surface, rejuvenating it with tar, and reapplying it to the extent we could manage it. While we would have loved to pave the entire cemetery — doubtless a project that would require an investment of hundreds of thousand sof dollars — we are nevertheless very proud to have achieved this much! Oh, and thank you to City of Cortland Mayor, Scott Steve, for waiving our permit fee; every bit of savings helps.

### Speaking of New Equipment, We Purchased Some Great New Gear!

As you'd expect, our professional-grade mowers endure a lot of wear and tear from climbing our steep hills, mowing around markers, and navigating rough terrain. At a cost of

nearly \$20,000 each — and with a lifespan of 5-7 years on average purchasing new mowers is a major expense indeed. Happily, we were able to purchase two new machines this year using a novel approach of 'borrowing' from our otherwise untouchable *Permanent Maintenance Fund* at no interest vs. financing in the commercial lending market at 5-8%! (Thanks to the NYS Division of Cemeteries for greenlighting this approach and to Board Member Mark Suben for helping with the necessary court filings.)
